#### I'D RATHER BE IN BENIDORM: Charlotte Grocutt

The Only Way is Wessex and I'D RATHER BE IN BENIDORM are a pair of intriguing new exhibitions on display in the #WindowGalleries at The Randolph Hotel by Graduate Hotels® along Friars Entry, Oxford. Both exhibitions are running between Sunday 22 August and Thursday 24 September.

The Only Way is Wessex features pieces that respond to the ancient earthworks of the North Wessex Downs and its sites of continual ritual. The North Wessex Downs is an ancient area of chalk downs located across Berkshire, Hampshire, Oxfordshire and Wiltshire. Its ridge, known as the Ridgeway, has been walked continuously since prehistoric times. Sites of ritual in the downs include stone circles, chalk drawings, standing stones and tumuli.

I'D RATHER BE IN BENIDORM is an exhibition of work by artist Charlotte Grocutt, who humorously responds to the not so great British summer holiday with a new series of historical plates. These two shows are linked by their mutual celebration of staycationing within the UK.

The exhibitions have been curated by artists and sisters Agnes and Mirren Kessling with support from community organisation Fusion Arts and The Randolph Hotel by Graduate Hotels®. During the pandemic, Mirren and Agnes formed Wessex Projects, a collaborative practice in which they create contemporary artefacts based on the local mythology and folklore of the North Wessex Downs. These artefacts include limited edition runs of clothes, artworks, food and wearable objects, with the items often being produced in collaboration with other artists and makers.

The Only Way is Wessex features a range of work by local creatives, including pieces by sustainable jewellery maker "i like the way she...", artist and stone circle maker

Of the exhibitions, Agnes and Mirren Kessling of Wessex Projects comment:

"The Ridgeway has always been a place of gathering, from the druids, to the ravers and the sunday walkers. There's a bit of magic there for everyone. We started Wessex Projects thinking up ideas of slogans for t-shirts to wear walking, reimagining street wear as path wear. Collaboration feels like a natural extension of Wessex Projects and over the past year family, friends, artists and makers have been working with us to create artworks, wearables and products and we're thrilled to be sharing the first ever group exhibition of our works.

Over the pandemic we've been forced into our local landscapes, people have found and formed new connections to local environments, folklore and heritage sites. We invited the artist Charlotte Grocutt to situate her work alongside ours, she uses ephemera and historical objects to poke fun at the notion of the Great British Summer Holiday. Together these exhibitions are a staycation celebration"

#### #WindowGalleries Background

The #WindowGalleries, which are located along Friars Entry in Oxford, are an innovative collaboration between community organisation Fusion Arts and the Randolph Hotel by Graduate Hotels.

The project connects and supports Oxford's communities, creating a lively space for the public to experience inspiring work by local artists. Rejuvenating the area in this manner helps bring vibrance and intrigue to the otherwise empty windows that so many people pass by each day.

#WindowGalleries kicked off last October with an exhibition showcasing the work of six local creatives, whose pieces ranged from drawings and paintings to ceramics and sculpture. So far this year, the windows have housed African art by artist Nadine Williams, with *The Only Way is Wessex / I'D RATHER BE IN BENIDORM* shows being the next of a number of exhibitions planned for the rest of this year and into 2022.

The Randolph Hotel has been shut for the past eight months whilst undergoing an exciting refurbishment and will be relaunching in late August with a redesign inspired by the unique heritage and history of Oxford as part of Graduate Hotels. Graduate Hotels is a collection of handcrafted hotels located in dynamic university anchored markets







across the U.S. and U.K. Each property uniquely celebrates and commemorates the destination it is positioned within through distinct design, inspired food and beverage offerings and locally-rooted programming and events.

### "i like the way she..."

"From a very young age, like most 90's and 2000's kids, I was obsessed with jewellery. I would wear necklace upon necklace, rings of all different shapes and colours and bracelets half-way up my arm – to me, they were very much essential when going anywhere. When I reached sixth form and started to focus on the things I really enjoyed doing, I started thinking more and more about fashion, in particular, accessories. I picked up styles from other people at school, people walking around big cities when we'd go home for the weekend and looking at things my mum and godmother were wearing or had worn whilst they were growing up. Styles would always change but the jewellery of each individual seemed to say something about them.

The name *i like the way she...* came from this love of picking up new styles. I like the way she...wears those rings, I like the way she...wears that necklace, I like the way she...styled those accessories – there is no better compliment than one about the small details of your outfit.

Every piece is shaped, filed, soldered and sized by hand, so each one will be unique. All the pieces are made from recycled metal, often vintage, which means that most of the time, you're even carrying a little bit of history around with you."
